OUR SCHOOL

Meadow Park School opened in the fall of 1987 as a kindergarten through sixth grade neighborhood school in southwest Woodbridge. The unique design of our building accommodates classrooms and activity areas in each of the four wings. One wing also houses our Orange County Department of Education special education classes. The passive solar function of the building's structure allows a reduction of lighting, cooling, and ventilation costs in a bright, open setting. There are 10 portable classrooms on campus housing various grade levels, and the science and computer labs.

Our teachers have an outstanding reputation for providing a strong academic program with an emphasis on high student achievement. In 1998 we became a California Distinguished School, which honors some of the state's most exemplary public schools. In 1999 we became a National Blue Ribbon School, which celebrates many of America's most successful schools. Both programs strive to promote and support the improvement of education.

CURRICULUM

HOMEWORK

Parents share with children and teachers the responsibility for homework. Homework strengthens school academics and builds student responsibility, as well as mental discipline, essential tools necessary for a productive and fulfilling life.

Forms of homework may include: reinforcement of concepts taught in class, independent practice and application, completion of assigned class work, missed assignments, long-term assignments, and enrichment and enhancement of school experiences through related activities at home. In addition to homework some children will have unfinished class work to complete.

Each child should read daily and complete homework. Homework is assigned with the following daily time guidelines:

Kindergarten	10 to 15 minutes
First Grade	15 to 30 minutes
Second Grade	20 to 30 minutes
Third Grade	30 to 45 minutes
Fourth – Sixth Grade	30 to 60 minutes

It is recognized that the type and length of homework assignments must be related to the student's needs, interest, and maturity. When additional homework is needed to fulfill the above time requirements, oral and silent reading practice is suggested. If you have any questions about your child's homework, please contact your child's teacher.

SCIENCE

Lab experiences are offered by a science specialist for students in grades 4-6.

INSTRUMENTAL AND VOCAL MUSIC

Students in grades 4-6 receive two 40-minute lessons weekly in either vocal or instrumental music. The music staff meets with the students at the beginning of the school year to make the selection of an instrument or vocal group. The Irvine Public Schools Foundation supports this program and also rents instruments to students. Students in grades K-3 receive bi-weekly music instruction supported by the Meadow Park PTA.

ART SPECIALIST INSTRUCTION

Students in grades K-6 receive 8 one-hour lessons from the art specialist each year.

DRUG ABUSE RESISTANCE EDUCATION (D.A.R.E.)

All 6th grade students receive 18 hours of instruction from an Irvine Police Department D.A.R.E. officer in this program.

ARRIVAL AND DISMISSAL

SCHOOL OFFICE HOURS

The school office staff works hard to provide the best quality services to children, staff and parents. We ask that you sign in with the office and pick up a visitor or volunteer badge before visiting the instructional area. The office is open from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Students may not be on campus prior to 15 minutes before their school day begins (grades K-6, 7:55 a.m.) and all students must leave directly after school as supervision is not provided.

Kindergarten parents/caregivers must supervise their children before the school day begins. Kindergarten parents and caregivers must meet the teacher at dismissal.

The school grounds/playground are for the sole use of Meadow Park students during the school day, and are not open to pre-schoolers or older/younger siblings during school hours. Parents need to be on time to pick up their children and all students should go home directly after school.

ATTENDANCE

If your child is not in school, for any reason, the State of California does not pay the district. However, we understand there are times when your child cannot be in school. Therefore, please telephone the attendance line before 9:00 a.m. at (949) 936-5901 **each** day your student is absent. SDC parents, please also remember to call our transportation department at (949) 936-5370.

Vacation

Your child may take advantage of an "Independent Study" contract when he/she misses five (5) or more consecutive days of school. This is the only instance in which we receive money for absent children. Please notify the office at least one week in advance of any planned vacation to initiate the Independent Study Contract.

Late Arrival

Each student **must** sign in at the front office if he/she is not in line when the final bell in the morning sounds. Your student will receive a red tardy card to give to the teacher. We appreciate your making dental or doctor appointments after school hours. However, if you find it necessary to schedule a medical appointment during your child's class time, please "SIGN OUT" your child in the office. Do not go directly to the classroom for your child at any time. This minimizes the disruption to our instructional program and keeps all students safe at school.

Students will be released only to persons designated on the emergency card. For your child's safety, telephone permission for release to undesignated persons cannot be accepted. Faxed notes are acceptable with your signature.

RAINBOW RISING CHILD CARE

The Rainbow Rising Child Care Program at Meadow Park School provides affordable, quality childcare and day camps for elementary school-age children of working parents. Professional staff in a caring, nurturing environment supervise children. The program operates daily, Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. For further information, please call (949) 651-0678.

BICYCLES

The following guidelines are established to prevent injury or loss of property.

1. Students riding bicycles to school must be in 3rd, 4th, 5th or 6th grade.
2. All 3rd through 6th grade students who ride their bicycles to and from school **MUST WEAR A BICYCLE HELMET.**
3. All bicycles must be WALKED while on school grounds and across the driveways to the parking lot.



WALKING TO AND FROM SCHOOL

Parents are urged to discuss safety rules and the responsibilities of good citizenship with their children in regard to walking to and from school. The City of Irvine provides crossing guards at **Thunder Run/West Yale Loop, Blue Lake South/West Yale Loop, and Early Morn/Blue Lake South.**

These points should be stressed:

- a. Come directly to school from home.
- b. Walk on the sidewalk and inside the crosswalks.
- c. Cross streets only at the corners and crosswalks and with the crossing guard who is on duty before and after school. To ensure students' safety and compliance with school rules, written warnings can be issued to students (with or without an adult present) if they cross streets in an unsafe manner.
- d. Go directly home after school. Do not talk to strangers.

We highly encourage students to use the supervised crosswalk. Not only is jaywalking dangerous, it is a citable offense by the Irvine Police Department.

DRIVING AND PARKING

If you find it necessary to drive your child to school, we ask that you be aware of the safety of all children when driving in the vicinity of the school.

Due to the limited number of parking spaces the parking lot is reserved for staff only. To ensure the safety of our students, parents are not permitted to drive through the parking lot for any reason. Nor are the parents or children to walk through the parking lot.

Parking is permitted on the west side of Blue Lake South between the posted signs. A loading zone is between and on either side of the school driveways. Parking is not permitted in this zone. Do not leave your car in this area even if it is only for a couple minutes. Drop off children next to the curb. Do not double park or block the road. U-turns are illegal on Blue Lake South.

DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

ADULTS ON CAMPUS

Parents are welcome on campus. For the protection of the children, and in respect for the teacher's instructional responsibilities, please schedule your classroom visit in advance and always sign in with the office personnel.

ALL ADULTS (VOLUNTEERS OR VISITORS) MUST SIGN IN AT THE SCHOOL OFFICE regardless of visit's length and pick up a visitor's badge which should be worn while at school. Consistent enforcement of this policy is necessary to ensure the safety of all children and staff and protect continuity of instruction. Thank you for your cooperation. Any parent without a name badge will be asked to return to the office to sign in.

RELEASING CHILDREN DURING THE SCHOOL DAY

If you need to have your child leave school before the regular dismissal time, you must come to the office and sign your child out. The office staff will notify the teacher to send your child to the office. **No child is permitted to leave campus at any time during the day, including lunch time, without a designated adult signature listed on the emergency card.** Please have your child sign back in at the office if he/she returns to school that day.

CLASSROOM INTERRUPTIONS

One of our priorities is to have students develop responsibility. To this end, **Meadow Park School staff members will not accept homework, library books, musical instruments, forgotten items or projects once school begins.** We need your support in allowing your child to assume responsibility in their daily lives.

LOST AND FOUND

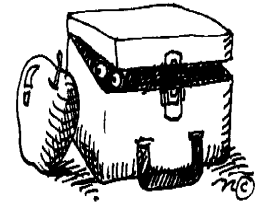
A lost and found cart is located outside the multi-purpose room in the First Grade courtyard. Parents and students are welcome to check it at any time for lost items. Small items such as glasses, retainers and jewelry, as well as musical instruments, are kept in the office. We urge parents to **LABEL EVERYTHING** that is sent to school. Items that are labeled are easier to locate when they are put in the lost and found.

ANIMALS ON CAMPUS

For the safety and comfort of our students, animals are not allowed on campus, even if they are on a leash or carried. Some children are afraid of animals or may be allergic to them.

LUNCHES

Hot lunches may be purchased for \$3.25. Pre-payments may be made at school or online through the Lunch Box program at http://www.iusd.org/district_services/food_services/index.html



Checks are to be made out to IUSD Food Services. Please include your student's PIN number on the check.

Reminders concerning the lunch program are:

- Milk may be purchased for \$.75.
- Late lunches are to be labeled with child's and teacher's names and placed in the blue lunch box in the office.

USE OF TELEPHONES AND CELL PHONES

We ask that you take care of all arrangements for the day with your children before they leave for school. If the forecast is for rain, send them in a coat or jacket and give them a plan for pick up/dismissal for inclement weather. If after school activities are scheduled, be certain that they know what is expected of them before they leave for school. **We ask that ONLY EMERGENCY MESSAGES be telephoned in to children, since we strive to keep instructional interruptions to a minimum.** Arrangements with friends must be made prior to coming to school.

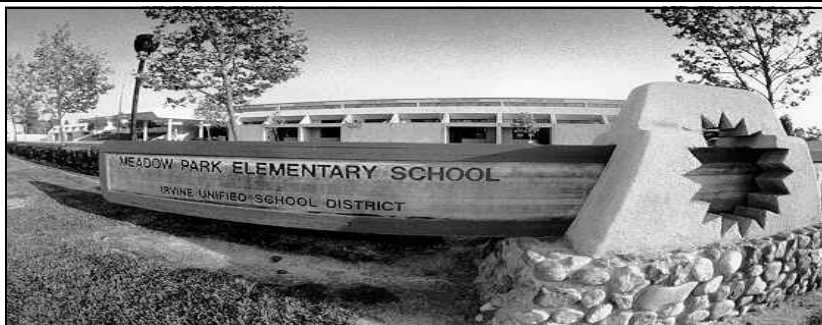
Cell phones are permitted at school, however, board policy requires that they be deactivated during the regular school day and used only during an emergency affecting the school or community. ***The use of cell phones is prohibited during school hours.*** They are to be **turned off** and **in the student's backpack** during school hours.

FIELD TRIP PROCEDURES

Each student must have a completed parent permission slip prior to participating in a field trip. Teachers provide specific instructions for each field trip prior to the event. Verbal and/or faxed permission will not be accepted.

TEXTBOOKS/LIBRARY BOOKS

Textbooks and library books are school property and are loaned to students. Students are responsible for their safekeeping. It is the responsibility of the student to pay for lost or damaged books.



HEALTH, PROGRAMS AND SUPPORT SERVICES

Meadow Park provides many programs, which assist students in special need areas. These programs offer assessment and service for students by our specialists who deal with learning strengths and weaknesses, speech and language skills, health related concerns, and psychological needs.

The Meadow Park staff has a strong commitment to assist children with special needs and encourages parents who have a concern about their child to request assistance and support from the Individualized Education Program Team (I.E.P. Team) consisting of the principal, psychologist, resource specialist, classroom teacher and the speech and language pathologist. The specialists also function in a consultative role to staff and parents regarding any student's need.

HEALTH SERVICES

District nursing staff provides students with vision screening (grades K, 3, 6) and hearing screening (grades K, 2, 5) and assists students who have physical impairments and health related problems. Information and guidance is provided to staff, parents, and students when medical conditions affect academic and social growth. Support from our district and our PTA provides a Health Clerk five days a week.

PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES

The school psychologist provides assistance for behavioral, social/emotional, and cognitive needs of students. Diagnosis of student needs, guidance for students and parents, testing and consultation to staff are available.

RESOURCE SPECIALIST PROGRAM

This program is designed to assist children who demonstrate significant deficits in academic skills. A student can qualify for this program by demonstrating a specific learning disability or a significant discrepancy between ability and academic achievement. After a student is identified as qualifying for this program, an Individualized Educational Plan is designed to assist the student to make reasonable academic gains.

SPECIAL DAY CLASSES

IUSD provides students with a minimal or total support system (academic, behavioral, personal, vocational, transition) through which he/she can acquire knowledge and those skills necessary to function in the regular classroom and ultimately in society.

SPEECH AND LANGUAGE PATHOLOGIST

This program is designed to diagnose and provide therapy for students who demonstrate difficulty in speech, language development, and language-based skills. Students who qualify for this program have an Individualized Educational Plan designed for them and receive individual or small group assistance as appropriate.

TITLE I PROGRAM

Title 1 funds support multiple programs including: Early Intervention Reading Model for small group reading interventions

in the K-1 classrooms; Read Naturally, a program targeting reading fluency in grades 2-3; Read 180 using technology, reading selections matched to reading levels, small group instruction for grades 4-6; and small group math instruction.

ENGLISH LEARNERS

Students who have been identified as English Learners will receive additional support to assist them in reading, writing, listening, and speaking standards. With guidance from the classroom teacher, students will work towards meeting their English Language Development Standards.

GIFTED AND TALENTED EDUCATION

The Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) program is provided for students in grades 4-6 who are identified with exceptional learning abilities. This program consists of small clusters of identified students within the general education classroom with a teacher who has been trained in meeting the needs of the gifted students. Appropriately differentiated instruction including depth, complexity, acceleration and novelty is taught within the core curriculum.

STUDENT ACCIDENT & HEALTH INSURANCE

The school district makes available to parents a low cost accident and health insurance for their children. Forms are distributed to parents the first day of school. Additional forms are available in the office. The desirability of having such a plan can provide benefits and coverage when help is needed.

MEDICATION AT SCHOOL

Any time your child requires medication at school, the medication must be kept in the health office to be given by school personnel. LEGALLY, the district requires:

1. Medication MUST be in the ORIGINAL pharmacy bottle, properly labeled by the pharmacist.
2. Both the physician and a parent must sign a consent form prior to medication being administered at school. This form is available in the school office.
3. Medication MUST be brought to school by a parent. At no time should medication arrive at school in a lunch box, baggie, etc.

These regulations apply to NON-PRESCRIPTION medications as well. Non-prescription drugs include aspirin, vitamins, cough syrup, cough drops, ointments, etc.

- Please do not ask school personnel to administer medications supplied by you until the above mentioned requirements have been met.
- Please do not ask school personnel to supply your child with medication. No medications are supplied by the school.
- Please do not send your child to school with medications of any kind unless you have complied with the requirements listed above.

COMMUNICATION WITH PARENTS

PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION

Meadow Park School is pleased to acknowledge the support of an active group of parents who devote their time and talents to promote activities and events for our students. Our parents also assist in providing financial support, not available through other means, which improves the quality of learning and increases opportunities for enrichment for all students.

PTA activities establish communication between school and home. Parents are encouraged to attend meetings, support activities, and volunteer. Dates and times of meetings and activities will be on the Meadow Park website and on our school calendar in order to keep everyone informed.

OPEN DOOR POLICY/VOLUNTEERS

Meadow Park welcomes and values our volunteer parents. Without volunteers, many programs and activities offered at our school would not be possible. This open door policy requires that all parents/guardians/volunteers sign in at the front office during school hours and prior to visiting the classroom or the lunch/playground areas. We require this procedure to help us locate you in the event of an emergency, phone call for you, to prevent interruptions to the teacher and students during valuable instructional time, and most importantly, to protect your children. All visitors must wear a visitor/volunteer sticker when they are on school grounds. These badges are located next to the sign-in clipboard in the front office.

NOTE: All volunteers must complete an IUSD Volunteer Registration and Screening Information form prior to volunteering. This form is completed only once, and it only needs to be completed at one Irvine school. The forms are available in the front office and are forwarded to the IUSD Human Resources Department where the information is verified; all forms are then filed at the District Office.

SCHOOL SITE COUNCIL

The School Site Council is a group of parents and school personnel whose responsibility is to plan, monitor, and evaluate our School Improvement Plan. Parent members are selected by vote of all parents in the fall. Meetings are open to the general parent community and the schedule of times is listed in the parent newsletter.

MEADOW PARK FOUNDATION

We would also like to acknowledge the contributions of this non-profit corporation made up of parent and community volunteers who raise funds specifically to support Meadow Park School in the area of technology. ENGLISH LANGUAGE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The English Language Advisory Committee is composed of the principal, staff members, and parents of English Language Learners attending the school. The ELAC committee has the decision-making role of aiding the development funds related to second language learners. Membership in this committee is open to all interested parents.

ACE AFTER-SCHOOL CLASSES

The Irvine Public Schools Foundation (IPSF) sponsors After School Classes (ACE) in cooperation with IUSD. It is a non-profit program that offers after school high interests and enrichment classes. Parent volunteers support paid instructors in this popular program. Please look for more information regarding this opportunity in your child's conduit and on the Meadow Park website.

VOICEMAIL AND EMAIL

All staff members have a phone message line and are requested to check it regularly. The phones in classrooms revert to voicemail during the school day and ring for the teacher before and after school. Each staff member also has an email address, and they check their mail at least once a day.

THURSDAY CONDUITS

In an effort to ensure that materials reach home, each child has an envelope that parents should expect to be brought home every Thursday afternoon throughout the school year. The conduit might contain both school communications and schoolwork/homework. We hope that you will allow time each Thursday to review the information with your child and return the envelope to school on Friday.

BACK TO SCHOOL NIGHT

During the first month of school, we schedule a formal evening meeting for the teacher to present the curriculum, policies, and procedures for the year. This is a night for parents only and a night for the staff to present general information, not specific student progress.

REPORT CARDS

Three times per year, report cards are issued for all students in grades K-6. The report card is sent home in an envelope each trimester. The envelope is to be signed by the parent and returned to school. For those parents who have enrolled in the Parent Portal, you will have access to your child's grades online.

PARENT CONFERENCES

Formal conferences are scheduled two times per year; once in the fall and once in the spring. The fall conference is a goal setting conference to select goals for each child and to review early progress. The spring conference is optional and serves as a follow-up when necessary. Teachers are always available to schedule an individual meeting to discuss concerns or issues.

OPEN HOUSE

Open House is scheduled in the spring to showcase students' progress. This event is an acknowledgment of the commendable efforts our students make throughout the year. Family and friends are invited to experience this popular event with their student.

BULLYING BEHAVIOR

Our goal at Meadow Park School is to create a safe, healthy, and happy environment that is conducive to learning and productivity. Therefore, we do not allow bullying behavior at our school. Bullying behavior is when one or more students intentionally do something mean or hurtful to another student. When a person feels bullied he or she may feel very scared, very hurt, or not feel well at school.

The following behaviors are considered Bullying Behavior at Meadow Park School:

- Saying things that hurt feelings
- Teasing or making fun of someone
- Laughing at someone in a disrespectful way
- Forcing someone to do something they don't want to do
- Sending mean notes
- Telling or making up stories about someone
- Scaring others
- Threatening to hurt someone
- Breaking or taking something that belongs to others
- Physically hurting others

ZERO TOLERANCE

The Irvine Unified School District enforces a policy of **zero tolerance**. This means that the following violations will result in immediate suspension and expulsion from IUSD:

- Possession of a firearm
- Brandishing a knife
- Sale of a controlled substance
- Committed or attempted to commit a sexual assault

In addition, the following violations will result in immediate suspension and determination of further actions which may result in expulsion proceedings:

- Serious physical injury to others
- Possession of knives, explosives, or other dangerous objects
- Possession of controlled substance
- Robbery or extortion
- Assault or battery upon any school employee

These policies comply with Education Code statutes and regulations. They are in effect to ensure a safe learning environment.

DRESS CODE AND GROOMING STANDARDS

Parents have the primary responsibility to see that their children are ***dressed in a manner which is clean, not hazardous to their safety, or disruptive to instruction.*** For these reasons and to be consistent with standards set by South Lake Middle School, we are sharing the following guidelines and request your assistance in guiding your child ***to dress in a manner which shows they are ready for school and are respectful of themselves and others.***

Students may not wear:

- attire which is sexually suggestive or brief (midriff tops, halters, spaghetti straps less than 1 1/2" wide, short shorts, etc.)
- sagging, baggy clothing
- clothing that allows undergarments to be exposed
- attire that advertises any type of alcohol, drugs, violence or that is obscene
- make-up, body glitter, or colored hair gel
- jewelry or other accessories which pose a threat to their safety or the safety of other students (e.g. dangling earrings)
- bandanas, sweatbands, do-rags, or scarves (except for religious reasons)
- hats, caps, or visors inside the building
- sunglasses (except for medical reasons)
- flip-flops, sandals, sock-like footwear, sport shoes with retractable roller blades, slides, backless shoes, high platform shoes or slippers. Students should wear athletic shoes when P.E. is scheduled. Closed toe shoes must be worn at all times.

If your child wears prohibited attire, we will:

1. Call home/work for appropriate clothing.
2. If families are unavailable, students will use clothing from Lost and Found, to be washed and returned the next day.

Note: Students may not return to class until appropriately dressed.



STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

SCHOOL RULES

GENERAL

- Personal belongings such as skateboards, roller blades, scooters, iPods, hand-held laser pointers, or electronic equipment are not permitted on school grounds.
- Cell phones must be turned off and placed in student's backpack during school hours.
- Students will use appropriate language both in the classroom and on the playground.
- "Bullying" behavior is not permitted.
- Students must have a pass to be in the buildings or atriums before school, during recess, or during lunch periods.
- Students are allowed on campus no earlier than 15 minutes before their school day begins and no later than 10 minutes after their school day ends.
- Students must use crosswalks or corner when crossing the street, even if an adult is with them.
- Playing in or near the bathrooms is not permitted.
- Gum is not permitted at school.
- Unsafe play (wrestling, tackling, etc.) is not permitted.
- Closed toe shoes must be worn at all times.

LUNCH/RECESS

- The playground supervisors are in charge of recess and will assist students in making good choices.
- Walk to lunch area. Runners will be sent back to walk.
- Once seated, changing places, visiting other tables, yelling to kids at other tables is not allowed.
- Raise hand for permission to visit water fountain, restrooms, and cafeteria. Loitering in these areas is not allowed.
- Food and drinks are to be consumed at the lunch tables only.
- If you forgot your lunch, check for it in the blue box labeled "Meadow Park." Check for your name. If the bag has no name, check with a supervisor before eating the lunch.
- Students should hold all trash until dismissed, and then place in the trashcans. Students are responsible for their trash.
- Wait to be dismissed by a supervisor, and then walk to play areas.
- Playing in line, taking cuts, and saving places are not allowed.
- Running and tag games are allowed on GRASS ONLY.
- Hitting, punching, play-fighting, Karate Kicks, unsafe play (wrestling, tackling, etc.) and switching teams are not allowed.
- To enter the building, students must have a pass.
- ALL play stops at the first bell. Students are to hold all balls and walk to their lines once whistle is blown.
- Football and soccer will not be played on the blacktop at any time.
- No personal belongings are to be brought from home including balls, toys, sports equipment, skateboards, MP3 players, etc.

NOTE: Baseball mitts are permitted only during spring baseball season.

SCHOOL DISCIPLINE PLAN

It is important to have a uniform way of handling discipline concerns (including those covered above for Dress Standards and Bullying Behavior) within the school and on the playground. Therefore, the following Discipline Plan is in effect at Meadow Park for infractions:

Meadow Park Warning Form (Minor infraction)

- Inappropriate behavior
- Bully behavior
- In building without a pass
- Inappropriate Language
- Misuse of bathrooms
- Not following the R.O.P.E.S.
- Playing on playground before 7:55 or after school
- Other

If a minor infraction occurs, the teacher sends home a warning notice to be signed and returned the next school day.

Three (3) written warnings will result in the consequences for one (1) citation.

Meadow Park Citation Form (Major Infraction)

- Fighting
- Bully Behavior
- Disrespect/Defiance
- Offensive Language
- Dangerous Behavior
- Other

A third warning (minor infraction) results in the first citation (major infraction) consequence.

1st Citation:

- Phone call from child to parent
- 3-day loss of playground privileges
- Visit to the principal
- More serious consequence if warranted

2nd Citation:

- Phone call from principal to parent
- 3-day loss of playground privileges
- Principal, teacher, parent conference
- More serious consequence if warranted

3rd Citation:

- Phone call from principal to parent
